LOCATION

When and where will the 2025 National Convention be held?

The 2025 NAEA National Convention will be held in Louisville, KY, Thursday, March 20 to Saturday, March 22, 2025. Most sessions will be held at the Kentucky International Convention Center. The Louisville Marriott Downtown (just across the street from the Convention Center) is our primary Host Hotel, and some events will be held there as well. Detailed information on all sessions and event locations will be available late fall 2024.

REGISTRATION

What is included with 2025 National Convention registration?

Registration to the NAEA National Convention includes in-person access to hundreds of sessions (including General Session keynotes), meetings, and the Exhibit Hall. Additional activities, events, and hands-on workshops are available by purchasing a ticket in advance (while supplies last). Transportation, accommodations, and meals are not included with registration.

Is there a virtual Convention option?

All NAEA25 programming will take place in person in Louisville, KY. Keynote and Artist Series sessions will be recorded and available to registrants after the Convention. No other programming will be recorded.

How much does it cost to register for the 2025 National Convention?

Please see the 2025 National Convention registration rates <u>HERE</u>. Please note: There is a tiered registration rate. Register early to get the best rates.

How do I register?

You can register online <u>here</u> (recommended), on-site at the Convention Center, or by using <u>this</u> <u>printable form.</u>

Is there a 1-day or partial registration option available?

No, there is no daily rate available for the NAEA National Convention. If you need to attend less than the 3 full days of the Convention, you may register on-site or in advance online, at the prevailing full rate.

Do you accept purchase orders for registration?

No, prepayment is required. We accept payments by check and credit card. Cash will not be accepted if you register on-site. If you require an invoice in order for your school or district to pay for your registration, please register online. When you get to the checkout screen, click on "Bill Me" and hit submit. The system will email you an invoice. Once the payment is received by NAEA, we can process your registration.

What is your cancellation policy?

Registration may be canceled until January 31, 2025, and a \$75 cancellation fee per registration will be assessed. After January 31, 2025, no refunds will be issued. View our full cancellation, privacy, and safety policies <u>here</u>.

Please Note: If you cancel your NAEA25 registration, it does not constitute cancellation of your hotel reservation or other travel arrangements. You will need to take the necessary steps to cancel any hotel reservations and/or travel arrangements created regarding the National Convention.

Is there a chance that registration will be at capacity upon arriving in Louisville?

No. There is currently no set capacity for NAEA25. Registration will be open through the duration of the Convention. Should that outlook change, we will make sure to provide that information via our website and email communications.

Can I bring a guest to the Convention? Can I bring more than one guest?

One guest per attendee is permitted. Individuals registering as guests must accompany a paid registrant and should not be educators seeking professional learning. Guests do not receive access to archived programming or professional learning credit for attendance.

Are meals included with NAEA25 registration?

No, meals are not included as part of the 2025 National Convention experience. There are various food outlets in immediate proximity of the Kentucky International Convention Center. <u>Please click here for a map of the downtown Louisville area, detailing popular local restaurants and more.</u>

TRAVEL and ACCOMMODATIONS

Are there discounted hotel rates for Convention attendees?

Yes! NAEA has secured discounted hotel accommodations at four hotels for the 2025 National Convention. Nightly rates range from \$219 to \$245 + applicable taxes. Rooms and rates at these hotels are guaranteed through February 19, 2025, but are subject to availability, so make sure to book your room soon, using the special booking link. How close are the discounted hotels to the Convention Center?

All hotels are located within a 5–7 minute walk to the Convention Center. Visit our travel and housing web page to get more information and book your hotel reservation for NAEA25 by clicking HERE.

What airport is closest to the Convention location?

<u>Louisville Muhammad Ali International Airport (SDF)</u> is the best airport to use when arranging air travel for NAEA25. This is the primary airport for Louisville, Kentucky, and is about 7 miles from downtown Louisville and the Kentucky International Convention Center. Travel to NAEA25 hotels from the airport takes about 10–15 minutes, depending on the time of day and traffic.

PROGRAMMING

What does the day-to-day schedule of the 2025 National Convention look like?

The 1st official day of the National Convention is Thursday, March 20, but some Preconvention events and activities will take place on Wednesday, March 19. The registration area is also open on

March 19 for you to check in early (recommended). Sessions take place Thursday, March 20 through Saturday, March 22 from 9:00 am to 5:50 pm.

There is a First Time Attendees session that takes place at 7 am on Thursday, March 20.

Where can I see the full list of sessions offered?

The preliminary session listing is available here. Sessions are subject to change.

How is session content determined?

Programming is selected from proposals submitted by colleagues representing elementary, middle level, secondary, higher education, preservice, museum education, supervision and administration, and more, following a careful review process. Extra care has been taken to ensure content is relevant to the 2025–2026 school year. In addition, specially selected keynotes and featured artists will deliver presentations.

Will keynote and Artist Series sessions be recorded and available for all registrants?

Yes. All keynote and Artist Series sessions will be recorded and available to registrants following the Convention. However, there is no "virtual" component to NAEA25 programming. All sessions will take place in person, and archived sessions are limited to the General Sessions and Artist Series sessions.

What is a Ticketed Hands-On Workshop, and how can I attend one?

A number of <u>Hands-On Workshops</u> are available at NAEA25 for an additional fee. Each workshop has limited capacity to facilitate more direct instruction and engagement for participants. You must be registered for the Convention to purchase tickets. Tickets must be purchased in advance of the workshop. Tickets tend to sell out quickly. We recommend you purchase tickets as early as possible. Details and ticket listings are available <u>here</u>.

I noticed that some sessions and events require the purchase of a ticket. Why do I have to pay extra for sessions?

Registrants have access to hundreds of <u>concurrent sessions</u> included with your registration cost. Concurrent sessions are different from <u>Ticketed Hands-On Workshops and special events</u>. The ticket fees help cover the cost of supplies, activities, and amenities for these events. If you choose not to purchase tickets for Hands-On Ticketed Workshops or other events, you will still have hundreds of options for sessions to attend.

What is a Preconvention Workshop? How do I attend?

What is the Artisans Gallery, and will there be one at NAEA25?

Will there be an Opening Night pARTy this year?

Yes. This year's Opening Night pARTy—**Disco Derby** will take place on Thursday, March 20, 7–10 pm. You must purchase a ticket for admission.

Is there an Exhibit Hall this year?

There will be an Exhibit Hall. Engaging and informative exhibits will be available from 11:00 am to 3:30pm on March 20 and 21, and from 11:00am to 2:30pm on March 22. Exhibitors will be listed on the NAEA National Convention mobile app.

What sessions are going to be available On Demand following the Convention? How do I access the On Demand content?

Only the National Convention General Session keynotes and Artist Series will be recorded and available to registrants following the Convention. There is no official "On Demand" or "Virtual" component for NAEA25.

Will I receive professional learning credit for attending the Convention? How will this be documented? What dates will be listed?

Registrants can download a Certificate of Attendance following the Convention. The certificate includes a blank space where you can record your total number professional learning hours. Please check with your employer and state for specific requirements for professional learning credit. NAEA provides a general form for your use that is not tailored to any specific district or state requirements or regulations.

Please note: Always check with your employer and state and local policies to ensure this event is applicable to your specific professional learning requirements.

Can I get University credit for my participation in NAEA25?

Yes! University credit is available through the national accredited School of Education at California State University, Chico. 15 hours of learning = 1 unit of credit and the cost is \$85. For more information visit rce.csuchico.edu/naea. The deadline to register for University credit is May 1, 2025.

KENTUCKY INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION CENTER (KICC) INFORMATION

Does KICC have a nursing room?

Yes. The nursing room is off the Market Street Prefunction Hall on the Main Concourse Level of KICC. NAEA will provide wayfinding signage to guide attendees to the designated room.

Is there a lost and found at KICC?

Yes. Please alert the NAEA registration desk of your missing item. All lost and found items will be delivered to the KICC security office at the end of each day of the Convention. You can contact the KICC lost and found team at 502-595-4362 or visit **kyconvention.com/attend/lost-and-found** for a list of items found.

Can I bring my pet?

Except for service animals, animals are not permitted inside KICC. KICC uses the definition provided by the ADA: a dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for a person with a disability. Service animals must be harnessed, leashed, or tethered unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work, or the individual's disability prevents using these devices. In this case, the individual must maintain control of the animal through voice, signal, or other adequate controls.

Is parking available at KICC?

Yes. KICC offers two neighboring parking garages: Cowger Parking Garage and Commonwealth Parking Garage. Visit kyconvention.com/attend/maps-parking for directions and rates for each garage. There are no in-and-out privileges provided at either garage, and parking is available on a first come, first served basis.

Are wheelchairs and scooters available at KICC?

KICC does not independently provide these services. Individuals needing a wheelchair or scooter rental are recommended to contact:

Student Engagement





FOUNDER OF ACADEMIC DECATHLON

Dr. Robert Peterson



"There ought to be more rallies and academic activities for all students," were notes handwritten in pencil, found in the late Dr. Robert Peterson's belongings. Peterson was a B-17 pilot in World War II who was shot down over Italy and became a German POW in Stalag Luft One for 18 months. History tells us that the concept for the Academic Decathlon was created while in a German concentration camp. By the 21st century it has become the premier academic competition in the nation.

Peterson's campaign in the late 1960s centered around an idea called an academic decathlon. It would include HS students, regardless of their grade-point averages. The aim was to get the average student to participate and work up to their potential. By 1968, these small pocket journals written in pencil in a concentration camp were transformed into an academic decathlon competition and the first academic decathlon was held in Orange County, California.

In 1979, the California Academic Decathlon was established as a formal organization. In 1981, the United States Academic Decathlon was established as a formal national organization. In April 1982, the first USAD was held with eighteen states participating.

The Academic Decathlon is designed to provide a forum for celebrating and acknowledging scholastic achievement and academic excellence in the context of a team environment. The competition provides HS students the opportunity to participate in an educational forum that fosters a deep respect for knowledge, cooperation, and self-esteem.

Thirty-six of the 58 counties compete in local, region and state competition with the ultimate goal of sending the highest scoring team to the USAD national competition. On average, 40 of the 50 states compete in the competition each year.

Since 1968, the Academic Decathlon has grown into the premier scholastic competition in America. To this day, the Academic Decathlon continues to bring students from all over America together to compete in a contest of academic strength.

Although we are saddened at the loss of Dr. Robert Peterson, a great friend to and the "father" of the Academic Decathlon, we have been privileged to be recipients of the wisdom and foresight of this most worthy educator. His active career as an innovative leader and highly creative individual enabled him to utilize multiple skills that promoted positive educational experiences for youth, initially in Orange County, California, but ultimately throughout the entire United States.

Dr. Robert Peterson exemplified all that is right about the American educational system and was a strong advocate for all young people. As founder of the Academic Decathlon, he enabled thousands of HS students to reach high levels of academic achievement through competition. Dr. Peterson will truly be missed. However, his leadership and educational contributions shall live on forever through the many bright minds that have been turned even brighter because of his insight!

REGIONAL COORDINATORS must complete and submit an electronic copy of the team verification form to the CAD office (champions and all potential eligible, at-large invites).

- 2. To be eligible for competition, only one team per school is permitted, and each team must include 2-3 decathletes in each of the Honor, Scholastic, and Varsity categories.
- 3. The number of Decathletes reported for the team is the official number of participants for that team.
- 4. Schools must be listed on the verification form to be considered for the state championship.

■ DECATHLON TEAM ROSTERS - CHAMPIONS

REGIONAL COORDINATORS must complete and submit the Team Rosters for all teams advancing from their region to the in-person state competition ("**DECATHLON**"). It's strongly encouraged for regional coordinators to communicate with their coaches early to get their assistance in completing the Team Rosters.

STEPS TO COMPLETE THE DECATHLON TEAM ROSTER AND UPLOAD IT TO THE PORTAL:

1. Access the Team Roster:

Visit the Decathlon Team Roster Portal and save the link for future reference.

2. Select the Team Roster:

• From the Decathlon Team Roster Portal, select the "Link to download Team Roster" and a blank Team Roster will automatically download to your computer.

3. Complete the Team Roster:

- Complete the Team Roster downloaded to your computer. Ensure all tabs within the "Team Roster Tabs Review" section are fully completed, as incomplete rosters will not be accepted.
- Complete the Information Sheet and the Team Roster (including primary/backup calculator brand/model and special accommodations).

4. Print Important Documents:

ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES

SCHOOL PARTICIPATION

Schools may participate in California Academic Decathlon's (CAD) program with as few as one (1) decathlete. Schools that do not have an official team may participate in Regional Academic Decathlon activities (i.e., scrimmages, workshops and other special events open to participating schools).

Participating schools that do not have an official team will not be qualified to advance to the state championship. Team eligibility requirements ensure consistency in competition.

Teams that advance to the state championship, either by winning their regional competition or scoring high enough to receive an invitation by CAD, will not be disqualified if their team number drops below the minimum required to compete as a team following the regional competition. This rule allows for unforeseen circumstances that may cause a decathlete to withdraw following the regional competition and before the commencement of the state championship.

TEAM PARTICIPATION

An official team consists of six to nine full-time decathletes from the same high school ($9^{th} - 12^{th}$ grade). A full-time decathlete is defined as a decathlete who is enrolled in four or more class periods per day. Each team is made up of two to three decathletes in each of the following categories: Honor, Scholastic, and Varsity, in accordance with the following grade point average (GPA) definitions:

Varsity: 0.00 – 3.19 GPA Scholastic: 3.20 – 3.79 GPA Honor: 3.80 – 4.00 GPA

Contestants may compete in a higher division than their own grade point average category but not in a lower division.

Each team member competes in all ten events of the Decathlon and is eligible for individual medals in all ten events. Only six scores count for the final team standing in the competition—the top two Honor scores, the top two Scholastic scores, and the top two Varsity scores.

GPA calculations for ninth-grade students include only their grades earned while in the eighth grade and in the summer session between eighth and ninth grade. The "focus semesters" for GPA computation for tenth, eleventh-, and twelfth-grade students go back two years prior to the present grade level of the decathlete. If the decathlete is a twelfth grader in September of the competition year, then the semesters that are used for GPA computation are all the tenth grade, all the eleventh grade, and the summer sessions between tenth and eleventh grades and between eleventh and twelfth grades. Likewise, if the contestant is in eleventh grade in the fall, the focus period for GPA computations includes the entire ninth grade, the entire tenth grade, and the summer sessions between ninth and tenth grades and between tenth and eleventh grades. If the contestant is in tenth grade in the fall, the focus period for GPA computations includes the entire eighth grade, all the ninth grade, and the summer sessions between eighth and ninth grades and between ninth and tenth grades. Regardless of the system used to determine a GPA locally, these criteria must be followed to ensure uniformity and equity among all participants in the United States Academic Decathlon.

Grades for courses shall be used in GPA computations for Academic Decathlon competition purposes if the courses focus more than 50% of the time on understanding ideas, concepts, and theories of a specific discipline and the assessments are objective in nature. Grades for courses that directly deal with the theoretical content covered in the Academic Decathlon curriculum and competitive events should be included in GPA computations. However, a grade for a course focused specifically on the Academic Decathlon should NOT be included in GPA computations.

Grades for courses shall NOT be used in GPA computations for Academic Decathlon competition purposes if they are hands-on, performance-based, skills type, non-book, lab-based, or more than 50% of course time is spent in service learning or internship. The skills that are developed in these courses tend to be more technical or vocational, and the majority of a decathlete's grade in these courses is subjective in nature. Please refer to CAD's current Acceptable/Unacceptable document.

Inquiries regarding borderline courses should be referred to the state director, who will make the determination based on the academic nature of the course, and who will then implement the decision uniformly throughout the state. The decision of the state director about which course grades are applied to the Academic Decathlon GPA tabulation is final.

For all alpha grades, all A's will count as 4.0, all B's will count as 3.0, all C's will count as 2.0, and all D's will count as 1.0. Anything below D will count as 0 points. When numerical grades appear on the transcript in place of alpha grades, they shall be converted to alpha grades according to the official conversion scale that appears on the school's official transcript or in the school's official profile.

If a student receives a Fail in any academic course, the F is counted in averaging the student's grades even though no credit is given. When a course has been failed prior to the focus period for which the GPA is being computed but repeated during that period, only the repeat grade is counted. When a course is failed and repeated during the focus semesters, both grades are counted in the GPA.

A grade, regardless of whether it is advanced placement, honors, regular, or remedial classification, will count the face value of the final grade as reflected on the official transcript. No weighting of grades for honors classes will be included, even if this is the local district policy. An "A" grade, therefore, will count as four points for Decathlon computation even if it counts as five points within the local system. Under no circumstances may an "A" grade count as three points. The letter grade shown on the transcript will be used in computing GPA regardless of any plus or minus. The state director may determine standards for eligibility for decathletes from schools with non-traditional grading systems. Such standards will be communicated to USAD for review and approval prior to the state competition.

The GPA for each student shall be calculated by dividing total points by total credits completed for the focus terms. The total points shall include the alpha grade points multiplied by the credits completed. Unless a school's curriculum defines the specific credits completed by a course or missing credits completed (mainly in 8th grade transcripts), credits completed can be determined as 10.00 credits for a full-year grade, 5.00 credits for a half-year grade, 3.33 credits for a trimester grade, and 2.25 credits for a quarter-year grade.

INCOMPLETE, CR/NC, OR P/NP GRADES

Incomplete, Credit/No Credit, or Pass/No Pass grades are not included in computing the GPA unless the decathlete received a letter grade that appears on the transcript. Once a grade is given to remove an incomplete, that grade must be used to determine the decathlete's GPA.

To change an incomplete, CR/NC, or P/NP to a grade, a coach "must" obtain proper verification and present findings to the regional coordinator for review. Proper verification must include approval from the school site administration and school district(s). The regional coordinator may assist the coach in obtaining the proper verification. The regional coordinator will present the findings to the state director for review. If approved, the state director will present the proposal to the United States Academic Decathlon Testing Director for review.

COLLEGE COURSES

College courses are included in the GPA only if high school credit is given, the course is listed on the official high school transcript and the course is an Academic Decathlon acceptable course. Credits completed are reported just like any other course credits completed within a GPA calculation period, using the number of credit hours completed as listed on the high school transcript.

HOME-SCHOOLED STUDENTS AND TEAMS

According to the USAD guidelines, home-schooled teams may not advance to the National Finals. Home-schooled students can participate in the United States Academic Decathlon (USAD) if their school district allows home-schooled students to participate in other extracurricular activities. Home-schooled students can only participate in the United States Academic Decathlon program at the high school they would attend if they were not home-schooled. The GPA classification of home-schooled students will be made in accordance with state law pertaining to home-schooled students. The State Academic Decathlon organization and/or the state director have final authority regarding the participation and classification of home-schooled students, and the decision of the State Academic Decathlon Association and/or the state director will be final.

Home-schooled students can participate in the California Academic Decathlon as a team if they participate in the Independent Study Charter Region or at the high school they would attend if they were not home-schooled (if their school district allows home-schooled decathletes to participate in other extracurricular activities).

FOREIGN EXCHANGE STUDENTS

Foreign exchange students are eligible to participate in the Academic Decathlon. A foreign student who does not possess a valid transcript may participate in the Honor category of the high school they are currently enrolled in. If a coach wishes to qualify a foreign student for the Scholastic or Varsity category, the coach must provide adequate evidence that the student performed at a relative B or C status within the foreign system during the GPA calculation period prior to participation in the Decathlon. The state director has final authority regarding the participation and classification of foreign decathletes.

CHANGING GRADES – TRANSCRIPT MODIFICATION

If a district, school, or a teacher has a policy of changing grades on a transcript, the new grade must be used for the computation of the Decathlon GPA. A grade adjustment must be reported immediately to the regional coordinator and state director to review the transcript and determine the new category for the decathlete before the next level of competition (round) begins. If a change to a transcript is not reported and the state finds out about the change, the decathlete and school risk disqualification for the remainder of the year and suspension from participating in future years.

DECATHLETE ASSISTANCE

Without a copy of a decathlete's IEP and history of how the decathlete has been accommodated in previous competitions, decathletes are not allowed to bring any other materials or aides to assist them in testing other than approved calculators for math and wrist watches (timers) that produce no noise, into the testing room.

If a decathlete wishes to use words or phrases from a foreign language in their speech or interview, then they are responsible for translating those words and/or phrases into English, and this must be done within the given time limit. Foreign language interpreters are prohibited.

VERIFICATION OF ELIGIBILITY

Each high school will submit official transcripts to verify eligibility of team members to the regional coordinator at the local competition the team is entering. The school certification of transcripts will be the final indication of a decathlete's eligibility and GPA category. The regional coordinator shall check the GPA computation in accordance with the above guidelines and verify the eligibility of each team member. It is the responsibility of the coach and student to ensure they are placed in the correct category. In California, GPAs must be calculated using CAD's GPA Calculation Excel Worksheet which will automatically calculate a decathlete's GPA and identify the lowest division in which a decathlete may compete.

ELIGIBILITY FOR STATE AND NATIONAL COMPETITIONS

For a decathlete to be eligible to advance to the state competition, the decathlete must participate in all 10 individual subjects (Art, Economics, Essay, Interview, Literature, Mathematics, Music, Science, Social Science and Speech) in Round 2 (regional competition) unless a valid, written statement is provided by the regional coordinator explaining the circumstance(s) and approved by the state director.

Each decathlete must be a full-time student for the high school they represent at the time of competition and must compete in the appropriate category (Honor, Scholastic, or Varsity) of Academic Decathlon at the time of competition. USAD recognizes full-time status if a student is taking a minimum of four classes.

TEAMS ADVANCING TO THE NATIONAL FINALS

Teams advancing to the National Finals must be comprised according to the USAD guidelines. The decathletes who attend the National Finals must be the same decathletes who participated in and won the state competition. No different or additional team members may be included except in the event of a student's death, medical emergencies, or other extenuating circumstances and only with the express prior approval of CAD and USAD.

The California Academic Decathlon has the authority to declare the first-place team ineligible to attend the national finals in accordance with the rules and practices of the state organization and may send another team to represent the state. In such cases, the decision of the California Academic Decathlon organization is final. However, CAD will promptly notify USAD of such an occurrence.

Upon completion of the National Finals, California teams (including online teams and individual participants) will submit officially signed, stamped, and sealed high school transcripts for all decathletes who participated in the national finals. Transcripts must be dated after April 1 and received by the CAD office by May 31, or the school will be ineligible to participate in the state or national competition the following year.

Participation in the Academic Decathlon is voluntary and is open to all decathletes regardless of race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, religion, national origin, disability, or handicap.

Questions regarding computing the Decathlon GPA or eligibility of decathletes should be addressed to CAD at gpa@academicdecathlon.org.

TEAM PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT

Decathletes and coaches are required to comply with the competition rules as stated in this packet. Failure to adhere to these policies could result in the disqualification of the participant and/or their team at the discretion of the CAD Executive Panel.

TEAM CONDUCT

The standard of conduct of all California Academic Decathlon (CAD) decathletes shall be no less than the expected standard of conduct for any off-campus activity. Appropriate conduct of decathletes is the sole responsibility of the team coach. The coach always has the legal responsibility of chaperone for their team decathletes. Decathletes shall be under the supervision of the coach, or another adult designated by the coach, during all excursions, activities, and facilities. In addition, the following rules will be enforced:

DRESS CODE

As representatives of the Academic Decathlon, their respective regions, and their high schools, coaches and decathletes are expected to maintain a positive and professional appearance during all Academic Decathlon-related events. Inappropriate attire may result in disqualification from competition or exclusion from awards ceremonies.

Objective Testing and Super Quiz

For objective testing and Super Quiz, decathletes may wear casual attire or clothing that represents their school or team. Attire may incorporate the current Academic Decathlon theme but must not include any content that could provide an unfair advantage during testing, such as maps with locations, math formulas, art related to the art curriculum, or information directly related to potential test questions. Attire should reflect positively on the individual, their school, and the Academic Decathlon program. Hoodies and sweatshirts are permitted, but the hood must remain down and turned inside out. Cardigans and windbreakers are also permitted, but coats are not allowed in the testing area.

Speech and Interview

For Speech and Interview events, decathletes are encouraged to dress in business professional or business casual attire. Attire should not include any reference to their team or school and should not include uniforms or costumes. Appropriate attire may include but is not limited to a business suit (pants or skirt) with a dress shirt or blouse and necktie, a blazer, sport coat, or jacket with a dress shirt/blouse and pants/skirt, or a business dress. If business professional attire is not accessible to all decathletes, alternative professional attire will be considered acceptable

Inappropriate Attire:

Unacceptable attire includes clothing that conceals the face or head (no hats, sunglasses, hoods), garments with excessive rips or holes that expose undergarments, clothing with distracting graphics or messages that could provide an unfair advantage (e.g., maps, formulas, art related to the curriculum), and any attire that may be considered offensive or inappropriate.

General Guidelines:

The dress code aims to create a fair and distraction-free environment for all participants. Attire must be neat, clean, and conducive to focused competition. CAD Officials have been trained and have the authority to address violations. If a violation occurs, the decathlete will be given an opportunity to correct it. Failure to comply may result in missing a scheduled test or, in severe cases, disqualification. Decathletes with medical, religious, or accessibility needs requiring exceptions should notify their team coach in advance to request approval from the

CAD Officials for approval. Test proctors will be trained to apply the policy consistently and objectively, addressing violations discreetly and providing opportunities for correction. Clear and concise dress code guidelines will be provided to all participants in advance, with opportunities for questions and clarification.

FINANCIAL LIABILITY

Financial liability for all damage incurred by the action of participant/decathlete shall be the sole responsibility of that decathlete and their parents.

STATEMENT OF COMPETENCY STANDARDS

Decathletes and coaches are expected to follow the highest standards of honesty and integrity while participating in the California Academic Decathlon. If necessary, a decathlete may be required to participate in any test designed to validate the test results.

The Statement of Competency Standards will serve to prepare the Academic Decathlon coach and their decathletes for the State Finals. Each decathlete will have achieved a level of competency through an established study program (formal class and/or extra-curricular program preparation) for all ten events.

Also, every decathlete attending the state championship will have participated in all ten (10) decathlon events (not including Super Quiz) at their county/district Academic Decathlon competition.

In addition, each decathlete will have met the minimum standards of achievement by:

- Studying the USAD Study Guide subject area outlines that are tested by the objective exams.
- Using the format and rubric of the Expository Essay writing style to write practice essays prior to the local competition and an essay for the local competition, all of which are scored holistically using the California Academic Decathlon provided rubric.
- Writing and presenting a three and a half to four (3 ½ 4) minute prepared speech before a panel of adult judges. Preparing for and presenting a one and a half to 2 (1 ½ 2) minute impromptu speech before a panel of adult judges.
- Participating in a six to seven (6 7) minute interview before a panel of adult judges.
- Participating in seven objective exams including Art, Economics, Literature, Mathematics, Music,
 Science and Social Science.

The coaches and decathletes will be mentally prepared for the primary purpose of competing in an exemplary manner at the California Academic Decathlon State Championship.

Coaches and decathletes will know, follow, and participate in the California Academic Decathlon scheduled events at the designated times. It is the team's responsibility to review the schedule and know the surroundings (i.e., location of arena testing, assigned speech & interview rooms and Super Quiz seat, etc.) of competition ahead of time. There will be no provision for making up lost time.

POLICY REGARDING CHEATING

It is understood that Cheating, in any form, is strictly prohibited and will not be tolerated. Any act of cheating will be reviewed by the CAD Executive Committee, which may impose sanctions, including disqualification of the individual and their entire team, depending on the severity of the offense.

Testing Integrity

- During all testing: Decathletes are not permitted to possess any testing materials.
- **During online/virtual testing:** Participants must remain within the designated computer testing window and cannot use any other devices.
- All testing: Violations of testing integrity, including but not limited to unauthorized communication, access to prohibited materials, or any other behavior that compromises the fairness of the competition, will be reviewed. Penalties may include disqualification from the test, the competition, or impact the entire team.

Disqualification

- Sharing current or previous years' tests or test items (excluding published practice tests) will result in disqualification of the individual and their school from Decathlon participation.
- Using outside resources during any part of the competition, whether in-person or virtual/online, will result in disqualification.
- Using a prohibited calculator (see Calculator Policy) during any part of the competition will result in disqualification.

Removal/Withdrawal

In case of emergency or illness, a decathlete must formally withdraw to be eligible for any awards. Formal withdrawal requires a written excuse to a Decathlon official. Leaving the Decathlon without formal withdrawal or being removed due to cheating or misconduct will result in ineligibility for awards and exclusion of their scores from the team's total.

CALCULATOR POLICY

Competitors May Use Calculators for the Mathematics Test

- 1. If competitors wish to use calculators on the Mathematics Test, they are responsible for bringing them to the test. Calculators will not be provided for decathletes who do not bring their own. Calculator use is permitted only for Mathematics; competitors will not be allowed to use calculators on any other test.
- 2. Memory does not have to be cleared from graphing calculators.
- 3. Teams will be required to submit a roster that lists the decathlete and the type of calculator, including all back-ups, they will be using in competition.

Permissible Calculators

If a competitor wishes to use a calculator, it can be a basic, four-function, scientific, or graphing calculator, provided it has none of the features listed in Prohibited Calculators. Decathletes that are found guilty of using a prohibited calculator will be disqualified from competition.

Prohibited Calculators

Calculators with any of the following features are NOT allowed in CAD competitions:

- pocket organizers
- hand-held or laptops computers
- electronic writing pads or pen-input devices
- models with an alphabetic (QWERTY) keypad, e.g. TI-92 or HP-95
- models with paper tape
- models that make noise

- models that can engage in wireless communication (transfer data or information with other calculators)
- models that require a power cord
- models with CAS (computer algebra systems), e.g. TI-89
- Desmos Graphing Calculator (new to 2025)
- NOTE: USAD has approved the TI-Nspire calculator so long as it does not have the (CAS) stamped on the back side of the machine.

Because companies are continuously introducing new products, it would be impossible for CAD to maintain an up-to-date list of specific model numbers that possess these features. If a competitor is uncertain whether a calculator will be allowed, the decathlete should bring a backup that does not possess any of the features in question. No backup calculator will be provided for any competitor whose calculator is disallowed.

Competing without a Calculator

Competitors may opt to take the Mathematics Test without a calculator; however, CAD is suggesting competitors use a basic, scientific, or graphing calculator for solving the trigonometry test items.

Calculator Failure During a Test

If a competitor's calculator stops working during a test, the decathlete should continue taking the test without a calculator. No additional calculator will be provided, and the competitor will not be allowed to take the test again later. However, as noted in Section III above, a competitor may bring a backup calculator and/or spare batteries to the test. Decathletes are prohibited from using multiple calculators during a test (i.e., a backup calculator can only serve as a replacement for a calculator that stops working).

GENERAL RULES & GUIDELINES

Written Tests: All written tests (Art, Economics, Literature, Math, Music, Science, and Social Science) will be administered in the Ballroom at the decathlete belongings (backpacks, purses, etc.) are secured outside the testing area. The proctor will provide all necessary test materials. All electronic devices, including those with Wi-Fi access, must be left outside the testing room. Decathletes may only bring approved calculators (see Calculator Policy) for the math test and Super Quiz math questions. Individual timers are prohibited during testing, and watches must be worn at all times. Please refer to the Code of Conduct for appropriate attire during the objective tests.

Leaving the Testing Room: A decathlete leaving the testing room for any reason must first secure the permission of a proctor, turn in the test and material, and understand that they will not be allowed to return to the testing room until the next test. Decathletes will not be dismissed from the test before a break and the final test until the end of the testing period.

Tardiness: Decathletes are charged with the responsibility of being in the testing room <u>on time</u>. Decathletes will not be allowed to enter the testing room once the test begins. The Decathlete will <u>not</u> be allowed to make up a test.

5 Minute Warning: Decathletes will be given a courtesy five-minute warning before the time is called during objective testing.

Online Tests. The Essay will take place online. Decathletes must start their tests as a team between the assigned testing windows. Additional information will be sent to the coach to share with the team and proctor(s). Coaches may not proctor their own team.

Meals: Teams will be responsible for all their meals and snacks.

Special Needs: Regional coordinators must submit any individual special accommodations for competition by the assigned deadline.

Super Quiz Relay: During the Super Quiz Relay, coaches and decathletes are prohibited from possessing study materials at any time, including while waiting to take their test and after completing their testing period. The use of any test materials or electronic devices by the team is strictly prohibited during the relay.

Providing School Name to Judges: Decathletes are not required to give their school's name to **any** judge during speech or interview, although there is no penalty for revealing the school's name or location.

Team Selection: Teams selected for state competition must be comprised of decathletes who participated in their regional competition. A Team may not exceed nine students (three Honor, three Scholastic and three Varsity). Champions may have less than two participants per category. At-large teams must have a minimum of two students per category in order to be eligible for the Decathlon.

Test Scoring: The SCORING CENTER is off limits to everyone except designated staff.

Test Challenges: Test Challenges can only be submitted through the official online Test Challenge Form and will be reviewed accordingly. Coaches are responsible for submitting all Test Challenge Forms online, and verbal challenges will not be considered. Please note that appeals are not permitted for the Speech, Interview, and Essay portions of the competition.

Decathlete ID and Emergency Information: Every decathlete will be issued a name badge that will include their official ID and schedule of activities for the competition. Decathletes are responsible for wearing their ID badge at all times during competition. CAD recommends that decathletes carry a picture ID and medical card at all times in case of an emergency.

EXPLANATION OF SCORING & TIMING OF TESTS

The Academic Decathlon has ten events and a Team Super Quiz. Ten events are weighted at 1,000 points per event for a possible 10,000 points, per decathlete. However, only six scores per team are counted for the team ranking, (top two Honor, top two Scholastic, and top two Varsity). The highest possible Overall Team Score is 60,000 points.

There are seven objective tests. Six of the objective tests have 50 items. The raw score for these tests is converted to 1,000 points with each item worth 20 points. The math test has 35 items with each item being worth equal points. Each test is 30 minutes long.

The essay is scored based on a rubric. Each essay is independently read twice. If there is a divergence of 200 points or more in the two scores, the essay is read and scored by a third judge. The third score replaces the divergent score. The two scores are averaged for the final score. Decathletes will have 50 minutes to choose an essay prompt from a list and write their essay. * The essay prompt selection for this year will include one prompt from Literature, Science, and Social Science *

The speech and interview are performed before a panel of judges. The judges complete the appropriate scoring forms independent of one another. The scores are averaged together and on a maximum of 1,000 points. Decathletes must present a $3 \frac{1}{2}$ - 4-minute prepared speech, $1 \frac{1}{2}$ - 2-minute impromptu speech and a 7-minute interview.

The Super Quiz is an oral relay event. In Super Quiz, each decathlete will answer 14 questions. Each question will be worth one point. The Overall Super Quiz team ranking is determined by the total number of questions answered correctly. The Super Quiz is a "Team Score" and will not count towards an individual's score.

During the Super Quiz one question appears on the screen, once the emcee begins reading the question Decathletes can discuss the question and select their answer. After the question-and-answer choices have been read aloud Decathletes will have 10 more seconds to select their answer choice except for the mathematic questions where students will have 20 seconds to respond.

EXPLANATION OF DIVISIONS

To ensure fair and competitive play for all teams, the competition will be divided into four divisions. This divisional structure aims to create a more equitable and rewarding competitive experience for all participants, regardless of their overall strength, ultimately enhancing the overall competitive experience for all participants and contributing to a more enjoyable and rewarding event.

Divisions 1-3 will have a similar number of teams to minimize score disparities and increase award opportunities for a wider range of teams. Division 4 may have a slightly larger number of teams to further balance competition across all divisions. No team will be split between two divisions.

EXPLANATION OF AWARDS

Individual Event Awards. Gold, silver, and bronze medals will be awarded to the highest scoring decathletes from each category in each event in all three divisions. All ties will be awarded.

Overall Highest Scoring Decathlete by Team. A medal will be presented to the overall highest scoring decathlete from each team.

Overall Highest Scoring Individual Decathlete By Category, By Division. Gold, silver, and bronze medals will be awarded to the Individual highest scoring decathlete in each category (H, S, V) for each division with the highest cumulative scores from all ten events (not including Super Quiz).

Super Quiz Awards. Plaques and medals will be given to the overall, top three teams in all four divisions. Super Quiz team ranking shall be determined by the highest two scores in each category (H, S, V) regardless of these decathletes' overall scores.

Divisional Overall Team Awards. First, second and third place trophies and medals will be presented to teams in all four divisions.

State Champions. The team with the highest overall score will be recognized as the state champion.

National Invitation. Six teams will advance to the national competition.

- The highest scoring team will represent California and attend the national finals.
- The next two highest scoring teams from the state championship not in the same USAD-based enrollment division as the state champions.
- The highest scoring Large, Medium, and Small school teams at the state finals will advance to the national online competition.

USAD recognizes <u>Large</u> schools with a decathlete enrollment of $\underline{1,301}$ or <u>higher</u>, <u>Medium</u> schools with a decathlete enrollment of $\underline{1,300}$ or <u>less</u> and <u>Small</u> schools with a decathlete enrollment of $\underline{650}$ or <u>less</u>. All four teams will be recognized during the awards and presented with their appropriate national registration packets.

TEAM PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT FORM

As a condition of participating in the California Academic Decathlon State Championship, we have received, reviewed, and discussed as a team all the information in the Team Registration Packet, including the Team Participation Agreement Information and agree to all the conditions as specified. We understand that the failure of any member or affiliate of our team to adhere to the policies and procedures set forth in said documents may result in disqualification from competition.

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
HISTORY OF COMPETITION

Recognizing the need for a well-trained workforce in the construction industry, the Construction Industry Education Foundation (CIEF) sponsors an annual Design Build Competition®. The event, founded in 1986, is designed to promote career awareness and create a fun learning experience for high school students.

Following defined criteria provided by CIEF, each team completes the challenge of designing and preparing construction documents for their structure. Schools compete in one of two categories: the Shed Competition or the Open Competition.

Construction of the structure takes place at the competition site over a two-day period. A panel of local architectural and construction professionals serve as judges. Structures are judged on the students' ability to perform all the functions of the project including planning and design, scheduling, overall project management, craftsmanship, teamwork and safety.

HOW TO GET INVOLVED



ARCHITECTURAL MENTORS

Support the students while they design their plans, between January and February. You are introduced to a school to help either in-person or virtually for a maximum of two hours to help them with their preliminary plans. The level of experience that the students and teachers have varies.



PRELIMINARY PLAN REVIEWERS

You receive two or three sets of plans to review and provide feedback to the schools. This can take a couple hours in the month of February.



JUDGES

Join us at the competition on the second day to walk the job sites and score each team's structure that they have built over the course of the two days. This takes place after the Industry Lunch and can take a few hours to complete.



IN-KIND MATERIALS

Ask about the materials needed for the competition and provide in kind donations or materials at cost.



ATTEND THE INDUSTRY LUNCH

Come have lunch with other industry professionals on the second day of the competition from 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm. Then walk the team's job sites and see the structures the students are building.









TEAM SPONSOR

Engage with a high school team by sponsoring their team. This includes signage on team shed, logo on t-shirts, team photo with logo, opportunity to visit and interact with student team prior to the competition.



ADVISORY BOARD

Join us in planning the Design Build Competitions. The time commitment is fairly minimal with an hour meeting four times leading up to the competition.






