NONDISCRIMINATION IN DISTRICT PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

This policy shall apply to all acts related to a school activity or school attendance and to all acts of the Board of Trustees and the Superintendent in enacting policies and procedures that govern the District.

The Board of Trustees is committed to providing equal opportunity for all individuals in education. District programs, activities, and practices shall be free from unlawful discrimination, including discrimination against an individual or group based on race;, color;, ancestry;, nationality;, national origin;, ethnic group identification;, age;, religion;, marital, pregnancy, childbirth, termination of pregnancy, or lactation, including related medical conditions and recovery; or parental, family, or marital status;, reproductive health decision-making;, physical or mental disability;, medical condition;, sex, sex stereotypes; sex characteristics; sexual orientation;, gender;, gender identity; or-gender expression; veteran or military status;, or genetic information; a perception of one or more of such characteristics; or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

All individuals shall be treated equitably in the receipt of District and school services. Personally identifiable information collected in the implementation of any District program, including, but not limited to, student and family information for the free and reduced-price lunch program, transportation, or any other educational program, shall be used only for the purposes of the program, except when the Superintendent or designee authorizes its use for another purpose in accordance with law. Resources and data collected by the District shall not be used, directly or by others, to compile a list, registry, or database of individuals based on race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, ethnicity, national origin, or immigration status or any other category any of the categories identified above.

District programs and activities shall be free of any discriminatory use, selection, or rejection of textbooks, instructional materials, library books, or similar educational resources.

The use of any textbook, instructional material, supplemental instructional material, or other curriculum for classroom instruction, or any book or other resource in a school library shall not be rejected or prohibited by the Board or District on the basis that it includes a study of the role and contributions of any individual or group consistent with the requirements of Education Code 51204.5 and 60040, unless such study would violate Education Code 51501 or 60044. (Education Code 243)

Additionally, the use of any textbook, instructional material, supplemental instructional material, or other curriculum for classroom instruction, or any book or other resource in a school library shall not be adopted by the Board or District if the use would subject a student to unlawful discrimination as specified in Education Code 220. (Education Code 244)

District programs and activities shall also be free of any racially derogatory or discriminatory school or athletic team names, mascots, or nicknames.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually review District programs and activities to ensure the removal of any derogatory or discriminatory name, image, practice, or other barrier that may unlawfully prevent an individual or group in any of the protected categories stated above from accessing District programs and activities. The Superintendent or designee shall take prompt, reasonable actions to remove any identified barrier. The Superintendent or designee shall report the findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

All-Except for allegations of sex discrimination or sex-based harassment, allegations of unlawful discrimination in District programs and activities shall be brought, investigated, and resolved in accordance with the procedures specified in Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures- for students, and Administrative Regulation 4030 – Nondiscrimination in Employment, for employees. Complaints alleging sex discrimination, including sex-based harassment, shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with 34 CFR 106.44 and 106.45 and as specified in Administrative Regulation 5145.71 – Title IX Sex Discrimination and Sex-Based Harassment Complaint Procedures, for students, and Administrative Regulation 4119.12/4219.12/4319.12 – Title IX Sex Discrimination and Sex-Based Harassment Complaint Procedures, for students, and Administrative Regulation 4119.12/4219.12/4319.12 – Title IX Sex Discrimination and Sex-Based Harassment Complaint Procedures, for employees.

Pursuant to 34 CFR 104.8 and 34 CFR 106.9 106.8, the Superintendent or designee shall notify students, parents/guardians, employees, employee organizations, applicants for admission and employment, and sources of referral for applicants about the District's policy on nondiscrimination and related complaint procedures. Such notification shall be included in each announcement, bulletin, catalog, handbook, application form, or other materials distributed to these groups and, as applicable, to the public. As appropriate, such notification shall be posted in District schools and offices, including staff lounges, student government meeting rooms, and other prominent locations, and shall be posted on the District's website and, when available, District-supported social media.

In addition, the annual parental notification shall inform parents/guardians of their children's right to a free public District Policy Manual CSBA Policy Management Console Policy Reference Disclaimer: education regardless of immigration status or religious beliefs, including information on educational rights issued by the California Attorney General. Alternatively, such information may be provided through any other cost-effective means determined by the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 234.7)

The District's nondiscrimination policy and related informational materials shall be published in a format that parents/guardians can understand. In addition, when 15 percent or more of a school's students speak a single primary language other than English, those materials shall be translated into that other language. (Education Code 48985; 20 USC 6312)

Access for Individuals with Disabilities

District programs and facilities, viewed in their entirety, shall be in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and any implementing standards and/or regulations. When structural changes to existing District facilities are needed to provide individuals with disabilities

access to programs, services, activities, or facilities, the Superintendent or designee shall develop a transition plan that sets forth the steps for completing the changes.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the District provides-District's web and mobile applications comply with technical standards prescribed by law, and as necessary, shall provide appropriate auxiliary aids and services when necessary to afford individuals with disabilities equal opportunity to participate in or enjoy the benefits of a serviceDistrict services, program, or activities activity. These aids and services may include, but are not limited to, qualified interpreters or readers, assistive listening devices, assistive technologies, or other modifications to increase accessibility to District and school websites, notetakers, written materials, taped text, and Braille or large print materials. Individuals with disabilities shall notify the Superintendent or designee if they have a disability that requires special assistance or services. Reasonable notification should be given prior to a school-sponsored function, program, or meeting.

The individual identified in Administrative Regulation (AR) 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures as the employee responsible for coordinating the District's response to complaints and for complying with state and federal civil rights laws is hereby designated as the District's ADA coordinator. The compliance officer shall receive and address requests for accommodation submitted by individuals with disabilities, and shall investigate and resolve complaints regarding their access to District programs, services, activities, or facilities.

Philosophy, Goals, Objectives, and Comprehensive Plans

CHARTER SCHOOL OVERSIGHT

The Board of Trustees recognizes its ongoing responsibility to oversee that any charter school authorized by the Board is successfully fulfilling the terms of its charter and is providing a high-quality educational program for students enrolled in the charter school.

(cf. 0420.4 Charter School Authorization) (cf. 0500 Accountability)

The Superintendent or designee shall identify at least one staff member to serve as a contact person for each charter school authorized by the Board. (Education Code 47604.32)

The Superintendent or designee shall visit each charter school at least annually and may inspect or observe any part of the charter school at any time. (Education Code 47604.32, 47607)

The Superintendent or designee shallmay designate someone to attend meetings of the charter school governing body whenever possible. and shall periodically meet with a representative of the charter school.

Monitoring Charter School Performance

Any charter school authorized by the Board shall be monitored by the Superintendent or designee to determine whether the charter school complies with all legal requirements applicable to charter schools, including all reports required of charter schools by law, as specified in Education Code 47604.32. Any violations of law shall be reported to the Board.

The Board shall monitor the charter school to determine whether it is achieving the measurable student outcomes set forth in the charter, both school-wide and for each numerically significant student group served by the school, as defined in Education Code 52052. This determination shall be based on the measures specified in the approved charter petition and any applicable memorandum of understanding, and on the charter school's annual review and assessment of its progress toward the goals and actions identified in its local control and accountability plan (LCAP), as reported in the California School Dashboard.

The Board shall monitor the fiscal condition of the charter school based on any financial information obtained from the charter school, including, but not limited to, the charter school's preliminary budget, annual update of the charter school's LCAP, first and second interim financial reports, and final unaudited report for the full prior year. (Education Code 47604.32, 47604.33, 47606.5)

Waivers

If the charter school wishes to request a general waiver of any state law or regulation applicable to it, it shall request that the **Board approve and the** District submit a general waiver request to the State Board of Education (SBE) on its behalf. Upon approval of the Board, the Superintendent or designee shall submit such a waiver request to the SBE on behalf of the charter school.

(cf. 1431 Waivers)

Provision of District Services

The charter school may purchase administrative or other services from the District or any other source. Upon approval by the Board of an appropriate agreement, the charter school may contract with the District or any other source for administrative or other services. (Education Code 47613)

Whenever the District agrees to provide administrative or support services to a charter school, the District and charter school shall develop a mMemorandum of uUnderstanding (MOU) which clarifies the financial and operational agreements between them. the District and charter school.

At the request of a charter school, the Superintendent or designee shall create and submit any reports required by the State Teachers' Retirement System or Public Employees' Retirement System on behalf of the charter school. The District may charge the charter school for the actual costs of the reporting services, but shall not require the charter school to purchase payroll processing services from the District as a condition for creating and submitting these reports. (Education Code 47611.3)

Material Revisions to Charter

Material revisions to a charter may only be made with Board approval. Material revisions shall be governed by the same standards and criteria that apply to new charter petitions as set forth in Education Code 47605 and shall include, but not be limited to, a reasonably comprehensive description of any new requirement for charter schools enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed. (Education Code 47607)

The Board shall determine whether a proposed change in charter school operations would constitute a material revision of the approved charter.

If an approved charter school proposes to establish or move expand operations to one or more additional sites or grade levels, whether concurrently with or unrelated to a renewal, the charter school shall request a material revision to its charter and shall notify the Board of those additional locations or grade levels. The Board shall consider approval of the additional locations at an open meeting. (Education Code 47605)

The Board shall have the authority to determine whether a proposed change in charter school operations constitutes a material revision of the approved charter.

The Board may deny a request to expand proposed material revision if it finds that the proposed material revision would render the charter school demonstrably unlikely to serve the interests of the entire community in which the school is located or proposes to locate. In making this finding, the Board shall consider all of the following: (Education Code 47605)

1. The fiscal impact of the proposed expansion on the District

- 2. The extent to which the expansion would substantially undermine existing services, academic offerings, or programmatic offerings
- 3. Whether the expansion would duplicate a program currently offered within the District that has sufficient capacity for the students proposed to be served within reasonable proximity to where the charter school intends to locate

Additionally, pursuant to Education Code 47605, the Board may deny a request to expand charter school proposed material revision if it finds that the District is not positioned to absorb the fiscal impact of the proposed charter school material revision. The Board shall make this finding if the district has a qualified interim certification pursuant to Education Code 42131 and the County Superintendent of Schools, in consultation with the County Office Fiscal Crisis and Management Assistance Team, certification pursuant to Education Code 42131, or if the District has a negative interim certification pursuant to Education Code 42131, or if the District has a negative interim certification pursuant to Education Code 42131, or the District is under state receivership. (Education Code 47605)

Location of Charter Schools

Except when permitted to operate outside district boundaries pursuant to Education Code 47605 and 47605.1, a charter school shall be located within district boundaries.

Monitoring Charter School Performance

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the charter school to determine whether it complies with all legal requirements applicable to charter schools, including making all reports required of charter schools in accordance with Education Code 47604.32. Any violations of law shall be reported to the Board.

The Board shall monitor the charter school to determine whether it is achieving the measurable student outcomes set forth in the charter, both schoolwide and for each numerically significant student subgroup served by the school, as defined in Education Code 52052. This determination shall be based on the measures specified in the approved charter petition and any applicable memorandum of understanding, and on the charter school's annual review and assessment of its progress toward the goals and actions identified in its local control and accountability plan (LCAP), as reported in the California School Dashboard.

The Board shall monitor the fiscal condition of the charter school based on any financial information obtained from the charter school, including, but not limited to, the charter school's preliminary budget, annual update of the charter school's LCAP, first and second interim financial reports, and final unaudited report for the full prior year. (Education Code 47604.32, 47604.33, 47606.5)

The District may charge up to one percent of a charter school's revenue for the actual costs of supervisorial oversight of the school. However, if the District is able to provide substantially rent-free facilities to the charter school, the District may charge up to three percent of the charter school's revenue for actual costs of supervisorial oversight or, if the facility is provided under Education Code 47614, the pro-rata share facilities costs calculated pursuant to 5 CCR 11969.7. If the District charges the pro-rata share, it may also charge one percent of the charter school's revenue in oversight fees. (Education Code 47613) (cf. 7160 - Charter School Facilities)

Fees/Charges for Supervisorial Oversight

The district may charge for district supervisorial oversight as follows: (Education Code 47613; 5 CCR 11969.7)

- 1. Actual costs up to one percent of the charter school's revenue.
- 2. Actual costs up to three percent of the charter school's revenue if the District provides the charter school substantially rent-free facilities

If the District provides the charter school with facilities under Education Code 47614 and charges the charter school a pro-rata share of the facilities costs calculated pursuant to 5CCR 11969.7, the District may only charge the charter school for the actual costs of supervisorial oversight up to one percent of the charter school's revenue.

3. Actual costs if the District is assigned supervisorial oversight responsibility for the charter school by SBE when authorized on appeal

Technical Assistance/Intervention

Whenever a charter school is identified for technical assistance based on the performance of one or more numerically significant student groups on SBE-established criteria, the charter school shall receive technical assistance from the County Superintendent. Such technical assistance shall be focused on building the charter school's capacity to develop and implement actions and services responsive to student and community needs, including, but not limited to, any of the following: (Education Code 47607.3)

1. Assisting the charter school to identify its strengths and weaknesses in regard to the state priorities applicable to the charter school pursuant to Education Code 47605(c))

This shall include working collaboratively with the charter school to review performance data on the state and local indicators included in the California School Dashboard and other relevant local data and to identify effective, evidence-based programs or practices that address any areas of weakness.

2. Working collaboratively with the charter school to secure assistance from an academic, programmatic, or fiscal expert or team of experts to identify and implement effective programs and practices that are designed to improve performance in any areas of weakness identified by the charter school.

Another service provider, including, but not limited to, a school district, county office of education, or charter school, may be solicited to act as a partner to the charter school in need of technical assistance.

3. Obtaining from the charter school timely documentation demonstrating that it has completed the activities described in Items #1 and 2 or substantially similar activities, or has selected another service provider to work with the charter school to complete the activities described in Items #1 and 2 or substantially similar activities, and ongoing communication with the Board to assess the charter school's progress in improving student outcomes.

If, In addition, if, in three out of four consecutive school years, a charter school fails to improve outcomes for three or more numerically significant student subgroups, or for all of the student subgroups if the school has fewer than three subgroups, in regard to one or more state or school priorities identified in the charter, the County Superintendent may request that the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), with SBE approval, assign the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence to provide advice and assistance to the charter school pursuant to Education Code 52074. the District: (Education Code 47607.3; 52072)

- 1. Shall provide technical assistance to the charter school based on the California School Dashboard
- 2. May request that the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), with SBE approval, assign the California Collaborative for Educational Excellence to provide advice and assistance to the charter school pursuant to Education Code 52074

In accordance with law, the Board may deny a charter school's renewal petition or may revoke a charter based on the charter school's poor performance, especially with regard to the inadequate academic achievement of all numerically significant student subgroups of students served by the charter school. (Education Code 47607, 47607.2)

(cf. 0420.42 Charter School Renewal) (cf. 0420.43 Charter School Revocation)

Complaints

Each charter school shall establish and maintain policies and procedures to enable any person to file a complaint, in accordance with the uniform complaint procedures as specified in 5 CCR 4600-4670 to enable any person, alleging the school's noncompliance with Education Code 47606.5 or 47607.3 to file a complaint with the charter school. (Education Code 52075)

A complaint may be filed anonymously if the complaint provides evidence or information leading to evidence to support an allegation of noncompliance. A complainant who is not satisfied with the decision may appeal the decision to the SPI. (Education Code 52075)

If the charter school finds merit in the complaint or the SPI finds merit in an appeal, a remedy shall be provided to all affected students and parents/guardians. (Education Code 52075)

School Closure

In the event that the Board revokes or denies renewal of a charter or the charter school ceases operation for any reason, the Superintendent or designee shall, when applicable in accordance with the charter <u>and/or a memorandum of understanding school and/or an applicable agreement</u> between the District and the charter school, provide assistance to facilitate the transfer of the charter school's former students and to finalize financial reporting and close-out of the charter school.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide notification to the California Department of Education (CDE), within 10 calendar days of the Board's action, if renewal of the charter is denied, the a charter is revoked, or the a charter school will cease operation for any reason. Such notification shall include, but not be limited to, a description of the circumstances of the closure, the effective date of the closure, and the location of student and personnel records. (Education Code 47604.32; 5 CCR 11962.1)

CHARTER SCHOOL OVERSIGHT

REQUIREMENTS FOR CHARTER SCHOOLS

This exhibit is a non-exhaustive list of legal requirements that apply to charter schools and may be used by districts to monitor a charter school's compliance with law. Other legal requirements may exist and may be identified in the future.

A charter school shall be subject to the terms of its charters; any mMemorandum of uUnderstanding (MOU) between the school and the District Board of Trustees; the state and federal constitutions, applicable federal laws, state laws that apply to governmental agencies in general, and other legal requirements that are expressly applicable to charter schools, including, but not limited to, requirements that each charter school or the entity managing the charter school:

Governance

- Comply with the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code 54950-54963), California Public Records Act (Government Code 6250-6270), conflict of interest laws (Government Code 1090-1099), and Political Reform Act (Government Code 81000-91014), including the adoption of a conflict of interest code pursuant to Government Code 87300 (Education Code 47604.1)
- 2 Except as otherwise authorized by Government Code 54954, hold the meetings of its governing body within the physical boundaries of the county in which the charter school is located or, if a nonclassroom-based charter school that does not have a facility or operates one or more resource centers, hold governing body meetings within the physical boundaries of the county in which the greatest number of students enrolled in the charter school reside. In addition, a two-way teleconference location shall be established at the school site and/or resource center, as applicable. (Education Code 47604.1)
- 3. The charter school's executive director or any of the charter school's employees shall not serve as a member of the county board of education in the county where the charter school is located (Education Code 1006; Government Code 1099)
- 24. If the charter school is attended by high school students and the governing body receives student petition to appoint a student member to the governing body, appoint one or more student members in accordance with Education Code 47604.2

Operations

- **35**. Not be operated as, or be operated by, a for-profit corporation, a for-profit educational management organization, or a for-profit charter management organization (Education Code 47604)
- **4.6.** Be nonsectarian in its programs, admission policies, employment practices, and all other operations (Education Code 47605)

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CHARTER SCHOOL OVERSIGHT (continued)

Admission/Enrollment

- 5.7. Adhere to all laws establishing the minimum age for public school attendance (Education Code 47610)

SCHOOL ACCOUNTABILITY REPORT CARD

The Board of Trustees recognizes its responsibility to inform parents/guardians and the community about the conditions, needs, and progress at each District school and to provide data by which parents/guardians can make meaningful comparisons between schools. The process of gathering and analyzing data also provides opportunities for school and District staff to review achievements and identify areas for improvement.

The Board shall annually issue a School Accountability Report Card (SARC) for each school site. (Education Code 35256)

In preparing the District's report cards, the Superintendent or designee may choose to use or adapt the model template provided by the California Department of Education. If the model template is not used, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that data are is reported in a manner that is consistent with the definitions for school conditions as provided in the template. At least every three years, the Board shall compare the content of the District's report cards SARCs to the state's model template, recognizing that variances are allowed by law as necessary to meet local needs. (Education Code 33126.1, 35256)

The Board shall annually approve the SARCs for all District schools and shall evaluate the data contained in the SARCs as part of the Board's regular review of the effectiveness of the District's programs, personnel, and fiscal operations.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for communicating the information contained in the SARCs to all stakeholders, including opportunities for staff and the community to discuss their content.

Notification and Dissemination of SARCs

The Superintendent or designee shall annually publicize the issuance of the SARCs and notify parents/guardians that a paper copy will be provided upon request. On Annually, on or before February 1 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall publicize the issuance of the SARCs, make the SARCs available in paper copy and on the Internet. District's website, and notify parents/guardians that a hard copy shall be provided upon request. (Education Code 33126, 35256, 35258) (cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

Additionally, when 15 percent or more of a school's students speak a single primary language other than English, the SARC shall be translated into that other language. (Education Code 48985)

In addition, the SARC shall be provided in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, provided in a language that parents/guardians can understand. (Education Code 33126, 35256; 20 USC 6311)

Each year the principal or designee at each school shall prepare a School Accountability Report Card (SARC), which shall include, but is not limited to: (Education Code 33126)

- 1. Student achievement by grade level, as measured by the results of the statewide assessment.
- 2. Progress toward reducing dropout rates, including the one-year dropout rate listed in the California Basic Educational Data System (CBEDS) for the school over the most recent three-year period, and the graduation rate, as defined by the State Board of Education, over the most recent three-year period when available pursuant to the Education Code 52052.
- 3. Estimated expenditures per student and types of services funded, including the actual salaries of personnel assigned to the school.

The assessment of estimated expenditures per student shall be reported in total, in subtotal by restricted and by unrestricted source, and include a reporting of the average of actual salaries paid to certificated instructional personnel at that school.

- 4. Progress toward reducing class sizes and teaching loads, including the average class size and the distribution of class sizes at the school by grade level, using CBEDS for the most recent three-year period.
- 5. The total number of the school's fully credentialed teachers, the number of teachers relying upon emergency credentials, the number of teachers working without credentials, any assignment of teachers outside their subject areas of competence, misassignments, including misassignments of teachers of English Learners (EL), and the number of vacant teacher positions for the most recent three-year period.
- 6. The quality and currency of textbooks and other instructional materials, including whether textbooks and other materials meet state standards, the ratio of textbooks per student, and the year the textbooks were adopted.
- 7. The availability of sufficient textbooks and other instructional materials, as determined pursuant to Education Code 60119, for each student, including English Learners (EL), in each of the areas of the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history/social science; world language and health; science laboratory equipment for grades 9 to 12, inclusive, as appropriate; and visual and performing arts. If the Board determines, pursuant to Education Code 60119, that there are insufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, it shall include information for each school in which an insufficiency exists, identifying the percentage of students who lack sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials in each subject area identified above.
- 8. The availability of qualified personnel to provide counseling and other student support services, including the ratio of academic counselors per student.

- 9. Safety, cleanliness, and adequacy of school facilities, including any needed maintenance to ensure good repair.
- 10. The annual number of school days dedicated to staff development for the most recent threeyear period.
- 11. Suspension and expulsion rates for the most recent three-year period.
- 12. The Academic Performance Index, which is reflected in the California School Dashboard, including the disaggregation of student subgroups identified in Education Code 52052, the decile rankings, and a comparison of schools.
- 13. Contact information for organized opportunities for parent/guardian involvement.
- 14. For secondary schools, the percentage of graduates who have passed course requirements for entrance to the University of California and the California State University, including the course requirements for high school graduation pursuant to Education Code 51225.3, and the percentage of students enrolled in those courses, as reported by CBEDS.
- 15. The number of Advanced Placement (AP) courses offered, by subject.
- 16. Career Technical Education (CTE) data measures, including:
 - a. A list of programs offered by the District that students at the school may participate in and are aligned to the model curriculum standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 51226 and program sequences offered by the District.

The list shall identify which courses are conducted by a regional occupational center or program and those that are conducted directly by the District.

- b. A list of the District's primary representative of the CTE advisory committee and the industries represented.
- c. The number of students participating in CTE
- d. The percentage of students that complete a CTE program and earn a high school diploma
- e. The percentage of CTE courses that are sequenced or articulated between a school and postsecondary education schools.

Additionally, each SARC shall also include the following information: (Education Code 41409.3)

- 1. The beginning, median, and highest salary paid to teachers in the District, as reflected in the District's salary scale.
- 2. The average salary for school-site principals in the District.
- 3. The salary of the Superintendent.
- 4. The percentage Expended for the salaries of administrative personnel, as specified.
- 5. The percentage expended for the salaries of teachers.
- 6. For Items #1-5 above, the statewide average in Districts of the same size and type based on information provided by the State
